Summary

2024 has been a year full of promise and regeneration for Green Across the World (GATW).

The promise comes with a remarkable effort on the part of GATW's Board of Directors, under the guidance of Meagan Van Woert, to search for a new Executive Director. After reviewing, vetting and interviewing remarkable candidates from throughout the United States, the Board settled on Kevin Brennan who is introduced below. Kevin brings vast experience and knowledge of international exchange with a strong interest in developing GATW's connection to African countries.

Regeneration comes in the form of dialogue with our Chinese partners about resuming exchanges during the summer of 2025.

Highly successful exchanges with Tottori Prefecture, Japan, were carried out in April (Tottori) and October (Vermont), with full and selective enrollment of 14 traveling students in each program.

On the periphery, the Vermont State Legislature passed S.30, a bill to create a Sister State Committee for the State of Vermont, Governor Scott signed it in to law in May. This created an advisory working group to establish the structure and standards for a Vermont Sister State Committee. Former Executive Director Peter Lynch serves on this advisory working group.

Message from Peter Lynch, outgoing Executive Director:

Nearly three decades on, I am excited to announce a major transition at GATW with the appointment of Kevin Brennan as Executive Director on October 1st 2024. You will learn more about Kevin below.

During the summer of 1995, five high school biology students from Fair Haven Union High School (now Slate Valley Union High School) cobbled together sufficient funds to travel with me to join the field work of The Conservation Agency in Hong Kong. This began a story that brought us into exchange activities with:

- China since 1997. Exchanges began (1997) in Guangdong, China, and were first reciprocated (1998) in Vermont, USA. Our focus shifted from biology to Culture and Environment as it has remained to this day. We are looking to resume with an exchange in Vermont in 2025 following the hiatus caused by the COVID epidemic.
- Japan since 2010. Exchanges between Tottori Prefecture, Japan, and Vermont, USA, became reciprocal in 2013 with a school-based exchange program in Tottori. Our relationship with Tottori deepened over the years resulting in the establishment of a Sister State Agreement between Tottori and Vermont signed by Governors Phil Scott and Shinji Hirai.
- Senegal since 2017. After an exchange in Senegal in February 2017, reciprocity is still getting off the ground. The promise is exceptional and we are determined to realize an established reciprocal exchange program.

Virtual Exchange with Senegal and Bhutan since 2018. Board member extraordinaire, Meagan Van Woert, put a team together to build a virtual platform, Youth Green International, to support virtual youth group exchange and enhance travel exchange experiences. Schools in both Senegal and Bhutan have made fun and exciting connections with Vermont schools through this platform. We are learning how to harness the full potential of the site and look forward to expanding its use.

GATW has built many informal partnerships over the years. Our relationship with Keeping Track goes back to the first Vermont based exchange in 1998. We have connected with the Vermont Agencies of Natural Resources and Commerce & Community Development. Many legislators have guided students through the State House, the Rubenstein School of Environment & Natural Resources at the University of Vermont has hosted students in the field, on the research vessel the Marcelle Melosira, and on campus supporting student research and project presentations. GATW is associated with Tottori Prefecture, Japan, including a Sister Organization Agreement with Tottori International Exchange Foundation, with the Affiliated High School of South China Normal University, and the Ministries of Education in Senegal and Bhutan. Schools, farms, businesses and consultants too numerous to mention here have also engaged with us. I would be remis not to include an important relatively new partnership with the Vermont Army National Guard to encourage and enhance youth exchange with Senegal where the Guard has a long-standing Sister Relationship with the Senegalese military.

On a personal note, I am incredibly grateful for and humbled by the support from volunteers, professional consultants, donors, and government officials including Governors Phil Scott, James Douglas, Howard Dean and Shinji Hirai, over the years. The New Tudor Foundation, the David Greenewalt Charitable Trust, International Paper Foundation, the Bay & Paul Foundations, the Freeman Foundation, Physician's Computer Company and Chroma Technology have all provided vital support at one time or another. It has been truly a team effort, and that we are thriving 24 years after establishment as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit business is a testament to all of you who have helped put our many exchanges together.

As I retire, GATW is in excellent hands, and the new phase in our journey will tell a story of environmental policy and action embedded in cross-cultural understanding as our students go on to effect meaningful change toward a more peaceful and reasonably prosperous future embedded in natural systems.
